National Dressage Pony Cup

Ever thought of traveling to a large show to compete in our wonderful sport of dressage? The National Dressage Pony Cup (NDPC) is worth the trip! This year it was held at the World Equestrian Center (WEC) in Wilmington, OH. What a grand facility for a huge show. There were 7 rings (4 indoor and 3 outdoor) running all day long both days. The facility is set up with matting and heights so you can ride from barn to barn/arena to arena. There is even a ride-up window at the coffee shop! All arena footing was incredible both indoors and out. Outside there were pavilions for spectator shade.

Despite the "Pony Cup" name, the show is for PONIES and SMALL HORSES (taller than pony but less than 16 hands). The show also does have truly open classes for all sizes of horses, but those are not eligible for the pony cup prizes. Some facts about the Pony Cup:

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- The National Dressage Pony Cup and Small Horse Championships is a two-day competition.
- Ponies compete in height-restricted classes. Small Horses compete in Open Show classes and designate that they are competing in the Small Horse Division.
- Each Pony or Small Horse/Rider combination must ride a designated test each day at the level they are competing to be eligible for prizes.

My Clinic with Lars Holmberg

On May 20th and 21st I rode in a clinic with Lars Holmberg at West Amity stables in Duluth, Minnesota. Lars has been involved in the equestrian industry for 45 years, starting and training multiple horses through the FEI levels. He has also been a US young horse team member in 2007. He is currently based out of California where He owns Holmberg Wadeborn Dressage with his partner Ulf Wadeborn. He is originally from Sweden and has trained at Stromsholm, the Swedish national riding school. He has also worked with renown riding trainers such as Bo Tibblin, Hans-Helge Rasmussen, Lars Palmer, Liselotte Linsenhoff, and Lillian Van Dahn. He continues to ride and train at his facility in California and teach clinics all around the U.S.

One of Lars's main focuses in training is ensuring the horse and rider partnership have strong basics. This includes focusing on rhythm, thoroughness, steady contact, and collection as you move up the levels.



I have ridden my horse Harry with Lars a number of times over the last 5 years and he has been a huge part in our development as a partnership as well as my development as a rider. During this two day clinic we started with focusing on simple transitions between gaits while being very precise. This precision included ensuring halts were square, transitions were timely, and Harry

way stepping forward into the contact during both up and down transitions. As the ride progressed these transitions became half halts with in each gait to encourage balance, and self carriage.

I have always enjoyed working with Lars, it is helpful to get a fresh perspective on my riding. I encourage people to ride with Lars if they ever have the opportunity. Thank you NWDA for allowing me to ride in this clinic. I encourage other people to take advantage of the scholarship program offered by NWDA.

The Benefits of Volunteering for NWDA

Volunteers are the life blood of NWDA! The Show Secretary is the only paid position at NWDA shows, but volunteers can earn show credits!

I received a Certificate of Volunteer Credits good for any NWDA show or clinic class fees when I was a scribe. Sign in and out on the Volunteer page at the show office. This is critical to earn your show credits. It's the only way to keep track of Volunteer hours in the organized chaos of a show. Volunteers earn \$10 per hour in show credits for most jobs.

I like to scribe for the judge, and it earns \$15 per hour in show credits. Wow, I scribed for 8 hours, and got a certificate good for \$120 off future show class fees! Scribing was interesting, you sit next to the judge, and write down her comments and score for each movement. Scribing is educational, you see many riders over the course of the day, and see what a movement done correctly, and incorrectly or brilliantly looks like! Legible handwriting is critical here; if I write too fast you can't read it. Slow down, tempo is important in handwriting as well as dressage. You learn that the judge

really does want you to succeed. There is a good list of common scribing abbreviations on the USDF website, that I found very helpful.

Kjerstin Anderson-Hoff is the volunteer Coordinator, and she has set up a NWDA genius sign up page. She has emailed this link to all NWDA members. It makes it easy to sign up, just pick your day, pick your job, and earn credits too! You will meet new people, learn new things, and have fun!

Find the link to sign up for volunteer positions on the NWDA website under the volunteers tab or email Kjerstin.anderson@gmail.com! She has also set up a google document listing how many show credits and dollar amounts you have earned in case you can't find the certificate she sent you! She will email you the link.

How do you redeem these credits when you enter on-line? There is no way to deduct the dollar amount of your show credits from the horseshowoffice.com site. So just bring your credits certificate to the show, and they will write you a check to reimburse you for the class fees, Easy! Peasy!

The T.I.P. Championship

In June, I declared my OTTB and I eligible to compete in the T.I.P. Championship in October, in Aiken, South Carolina. It represents a stage to showcase what we've worked very hard to achieve. Six years ago I fell in love with the one and only horse I looked at. I was 14 and dead set on this thoroughbred who had just come off the track 6 months earlier.

Finn, *Southern Parkway*, is a war horse. Hraced 58 times and won close to \$250,000. The first two years, I rode him for only 6 months between the various monthlong injuries he or I sustained, including a trip to the ER with torn tendons in my ankle.

These horses teach you that you really don't know anything. They bring out the worst and best in you, while teaching you how to grow as a rider, and as a person. Above all, they will always give you their entire heart and soul. Finn taught me more about being a patient person than a rider, but that isn't to say he didn't teach me how to actually ride, and still does! I am the rider I am because of him.

When I learned about the Jockey Club T.I.P. (Thoroughbred Incentive Program) this summer, I set my sights on the Championship show. Throughout the year, you take the results of all your shows, whether they have a class for thoroughbreds or not, and enter them on the T.I.P. website for performance year-end awards. On the website, you can find "apply for TIP number," and register your horse in the system. To qualify, you participate in a qualifying show, like NWDA's schooling shows. In order to participate, you need to declare your horse,

which is simply saying that you competed at a qualifying show, at whatever level you showed at, and are planning on attending! All I did was download the form, fill it out, and mail it in! Entries for the championship show opened in July—a separate online form to fill out. I am excited to be able to participate in anything related to T.I.P. because of the hours I've put



into Finn and my relationship. The T.I.P. program, for me, validates the thoroughbred's work ethic, their ability to adapt, their athletic ability and their willingness to please. Finn and I have an amazing relationship in and out of the saddle, with a nightly routine

(and if I deviate, he WILL get sassy, haha). I am excited to be able to showcase our partnership on a stage that is specifically for horses like him, horses that started from only knowing how to run, and who are transformed into champions off the track, giving them a second career. A lot of race horses, if they don't succeed in racing, are often tossed to the sidelines. T.I.P. highlights divisions for western, cross country, hunters, jumpers, and dressage. Any discipline there is for a thoroughbred, it's there, split between Aiken, and the Kentucky Horse Park.

From doing trot poles on our first ride, to jumping 3' six years later, I have finally achieved the goals I set 12 years ago. I am so excited to go meet people, see other horses like Finn, and hear other people's stories.

But mostly, I'm excited to go on another adventure with my best friend.
